History of the Faison United Methodist Church

The history of The Faison United Methodist Church spans one hundred years. The parent church of the Faison United Methodist Church was old Union Church of Duplin County, located three miles south of Faison and one mile north of Bowdens. Union Church was built as a non-denominational church at sometime after 1793. For the first 30 years, there was no regular pastor. Ministers of the Baptist, Methodist, Presbyterian or Episcopal societies conducted services there. Later the different societies had assigned ministers who preached on a regular schedule.

Faison Methodist became a regular appointment prior to 1870. In 1875, the Union building was moved to Faison and placed on the site of the present Presbyterian property. Later, lightning struck the church which burned.

The Faison Methodist Church was a part of the Everettsville District prior to 1873. Everettsville in those days was a center of culture, wealth, and a refined religious atmosphere. It was located in Wayne County, south of Goldsboro. The church building was moved to Mt. Olive in 1873, to be used as a worship center for the Mt. Olive Methodist. Everettsville no longer exists.

Early Methodism in North Carolina was first a part of the Methodist Episcopal Church. In 1844, it became a part of the Methodist Episcopal Church South. In 1939, it became the Methodist Church. In 1968, it became known as the United Methodist Church.

In 1870, Faison, Smith Chapel, Falling Creek, Zion, Indian Springs, Rones Chapel, and Mt. Olive were on a circuit. In 1887, the Mt. Olive Circuit, which included these seven churches, paid the pastor \$725.00 a year. In 1896, the total amount raised for everthing was \$600.50.

On November 2, 1885, Isham R. Faison and wife, Virginia J. Faison, deeded (for) \$1.00 to J. S. Westbrook, W. T. English, I. R. Faison, J. A. Shine, and G. W. Westbrook, Trustees of the Faison Methodist Church, the land on which the present Faison United Methodist Church now stands. The membership was 227, and the church was assigned to the New Bern District. The original wooden sanctuary was built on the southern end of the lot, facing the railroad and Highway 117. It occupied a small portion of the land. The balance of the lot was still uncleared. Church services were often interrupted by passing trains.

The following is documented in the June, 1922, Quarterly Conference Report by Reverend C. M. Lance: "We have nothing of special importance to report on Sunday Schools more than to say we have recently erected a tent in the churchyard (and another to be placed soon) to supplement classrooms in the Church."


On January 8, 1923, the Quarterly Conference by unanimous action gave C. E. Weatherby, A. W. Oakes, Jr., and Luther Taylor (Building Committee) permission to build an addition to the church for Sunday School rooms and to get financial aid from the Church Extension Board. At this time two rooms were added to the back of the sanctuary. In 1934, three classrooms were added to the north side of the sanctuary. The old wooden building never had restroom facilities. A gas heating system for the sanctuary was installed during the pastorate of Reverend Dennis Kinlaw, who served from 1949-52. Until that time, the church was heated by a coal heater located on the south side of the sanctuary. A large fan was installed, but the church never had a central cooling system.

In 1900, the Faison Church was placed on the Mt. Olive-Faison Charge. In 1903, the total amount raised by the two churches was \$1,211.41. The minister lived in Mt. Olive. The Faison Church had Sunday School on Sunday afternoon. The minister held morning services in Mt. Olive, rode the train to Faison Depot, held services, and returned on the evening train.

In 1913, Calypso Methodist Church was organized and became a part of the Mt. Olive-Faison Charge. In 1917, Faison was transferred from the Mt. Olive Circuit to a charge with Warsaw.

The Faison Methodist Church was then in the Wilmington District. In 1954, the present Goldsboro District was formed, and Faison became a part of it.

On June 22, 1918, C. E. Weatherby, W. R. Sutton, Jas. L. Adams, and R. P. Raeford as Trustees of the Faison-Warsaw Methodist Churches were issued a deed of trust for \$250.00 to the Board of Extension to finance the building of a parsonage to be built in Faison. This wooden parsonage was located next to the church and on the northeast corner of the original lot. It also faced the railroad. It was located on the same site as the present brick sanctuary. The parsonage was owned by the Faison group, but rooms were furnished by the different

churches on the charge. It was documented that C. E. Weatherby was to furnish the Pastor's Study. The actual cost of the parsonage was \$2,790.00. It did not have running water or electricity. The church and parsonage were wired in 1921. The minister, Reverend Frank Culbreth, in his Quarterly Conference Report on September 15, 1929, stated: "Water should be put in the parsonage and a number of things are badly needed there." Water and sewage systems were installed in Faison in the early 1930's through President Franklin Roosevelt's WPA Program.

The cleared land behind the parsonage was tended by the minister as a garden.

Reverend A. L. Thompson in the June 27, 1937, Quarterly Report wrote: "The preacher and his family were delighted sometime ago to come in from a visit to find some of our people in the act of entering the parsonage uninvited for the purpose of installing a brand new Frigidaire. It is just another evidence of the fine spirit of our loyal people, and we are inspired to do our best for them and our Master." This was the first refrigerator for the parsonage.

The parsonage built in 1918, was used until it was sold in September, 1960, and was moved four lots north on West Center Street. It stands there today. The charge then rented a house on Highway 117 to be used temporarily as the parsonage. On March 17, 1965, the Faison Church bought a four-year-old house on Winifred Street for \$11,500 to be used as the parsonage. The brick house did not have a cooling system, but air conditioning was added in 1966. It serves as the parsonage today. The deed of trust issued for the purchase of the present parsonage purchased in 1965, was signed by Trustees Ernest Taylor, Jr., Harvey Lewis, Norman Ellis, and Robert Lucas.

In the 1930's and 40's, the Sunday School made an annual trip to White Lake for the day. This was one of the highlights of the church year. Some drove cars, and a large truck was made available for the young people and those who did not have transportation. A picnic meal was spread and enjoyed.

Things did not always run smoothly. Epidemics played a part in the church life. Recorded in the Record Book for Sunday School for October, 1918: "No Sunday School on account of Influenza Epidemic for entire month of October."

Reverend F. B. Joyner reported on August 4, 1935: "We were not able to carry out our plans for Vacation Bible School because of the Infantile Paralysis. Our summer revivals were also postponed until fall."

During the depression of the 30's, people had very little money. Therefore, the members shared vegetables, milk, butter, eggs, meat, and other farm products with the minister. They provided the minister with the same quality of life which they enjoyed.

The Reverend Frank Culbreth reported in his April 21, 1929, Pastor's Report to the Quarterly Conference: "Each church has pounded us, and almost daily we get tokens and expressions of love and friendship. If they had a real preacher there is no telling what they would do."


The church held its first homecoming on October 23, 1949, under the leadership of Reverend Dennis Kinlaw and Church School Superintendent William Clifton. Many people came and it was pronounced a success. The church has continued to have a homecoming every other year.

The following was found in the church records: "The church conference was called on January 21, 1962, of the Faison Methodist Church, Faison, N.C. A vote was taken and motion was made and carried to give the Trustees of the Faison Methodist Church, Ernest Taylor, Jr., Chairman, Harvey Lewis, Norman Ellis and Frank Boyette authorization to execute a note and deed of trust to Home Federal Savings & Loan Association of Kinston, N.C. in the sum of \$20,000 payable \$168.00 per month. This loan is to be used for the construction of a church." It was signed by Dorothy Armstrong, Secretary and B. R. McCullen, Pastor.

Under the leadership of Reverend B. R. McCullen a new sanctuary was planned. On February 18, 1962, a ground breaking service was held to begin the new \$40,000 structure. The sanctuary which seats 300 people was built on the site occupied by the first parsonage. It included two restrooms, a pastor's study, and a nursery. It is in use today. The first service was held in the new building on December 23, 1962, The congregation struggled

to pay the debt, often paying only the interest on the note. In 1964, the services of the National Board of Missions of the Methodist Church, Department of Finance and Field Service, were engaged to help clear the debt. The Crusade was very successful, the debt was cleared, and the building was dedicated on November 6, 1966.

The church built in 1885, then served as the fellowship hall and education building. One of the five Sunday School rooms was made into a kitchen-Sunday School room combination.

A deed of trust was signed on July 1, 1977, for \$40,000, by Trustees W. D. Lewis, Ken Avent, N. N. Ellis, Leon D. Sutton, and W. J. Igoe to finance an educational building. There was no ground breaking ceremony. On a joyous occasion, the arrival of the construction crew, there was also a sad note, the cutting down of the old apple tree, beloved landmark for years.

The new \$94,000 education building was ready for use in May, 1978. The church received a gift of \$1,000 from the Board of Missions, \$3,000 from the sale of the Calypso Methodist Church, \$14,612 from the Duke Endowment in Durham, and \$27,500 from members who contributed the cost of $5\frac{1}{2}$ rooms. The remainder of the cost was raised by women's and men's clubs, who sponsored suppers and dinners, and from pledges and donations from members and other interested persons. Each fall a bazaar was held.

The new brick structure was located behind and adjacent to the church sanctuary. It contains 35,000 square feet and has a fellowship hall, a modern kitchen, restrooms, a study, and classrooms. It was dedicated on November 25, 1979.

In 1978, the old church sanctuary and classrooms were sold and torn down.


The Hines-Adams School and Church, which was located 5 miles west of Faison, closed in 1925 and its membership was transferred to the Faison roll.

Friendship Church was removed from the Faison Charge in 1956, leaving Faison, Calypso, and Kings.

Kings Church, which was organized in 1923, was on the charge with Faison until 1981, when it closed, and its membership transferred to the Faison roll. The structure, located about two miles north of Giddensville and about one quarter mile south of Skeeter Point, now serves as a worship center for migrants.

Calypso Methodist Church rejoined the Faison Charge in 1954. In 1977, the church closed and sold the building for \$3,000. Proceeds from the sale went to the Faison Church to be applied toward payment of the debt on the education building. The membership was transferred to the Faison roll.

There have been active youth and men's groups intermittently through the years, but Faison has had a constant, active women's group. The women have had much deserved praise from both women and men. In his Quarterly Conference Report on April 8, 1934, Reverend F. B. Joyner wrote: "The Missionary Societies of the charge are dead by no means. The society at Faison is doing work worthy of special note, as the report of Mrs. H. J. Faison, the president well indicated."

Mr. John Warren, Sr., a former church school superintendent, trustee, and lifelong member of the church made the statement in Sunday School that he had seen times when Faison Methodist Church would have had to close had it not been for a very active women's group.

Reverend Richard Lewis in his April 9, 1973, Conference Report wrote: "The Woman's Society of Christian Service has done an outstanding job, raising money to help pay off the parsonage indebtedness by participating in many projects. The women of the church deserve great praise for the work which they have done."

Through the years, the Methodist Women have undergone several name changes. First, they were the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society. In 1913, they became the Missionary Society. In 1940, they became the Woman's Society of Christian Service. In 1968, they became the United Methodist Women.

When many women began to work outside the home, the need arose for a night circle for working women. In 1952, Mrs. Kate Jones Adams invited the interested women to meet in her home. A night circle was organized. The afternoon society joined the night group several years later, and the society functioned as one group. On March 13, 1979, in the home of Mrs. Rita Mae Taylor, the Cora K. Clifton afternoon circle was organized. The circle was named for a deceased member who had been faithful to church activities for many years. The two circles function today.


Faison Methodist Church has been on the charge with the following churches: Smith Chapel, Falling Creek, Zion, Indian Springs, Rones Chapel, Mt. Olive, Warsaw, Friendship, Keener, Goshen, Kenansville, Kings, Calypso, Wesley, and Unity.

The membership has hovered between 200 to 300 through the years with a rise to over 400 at one time. The present membership is 201.

The church has received many gifts through the years. Some are listed in the Memorial Book in the stand located in the present sanctuary. A notable gift was an organ given in 1966, by Mr. and Mrs. Junious Lucas. It is still in use today.

The following bequests were made in past years: Miss Zilla Faison, who died in 1952, left her Carolina Power and Light stock to the church. It continues to pay quarterly dividends to the church. Mr. W. Frank Taylor, who died in 1977, left \$250.00 to Faison Methodist Church. It was applied to the church budget.

In 1983, at the Christmas Supper held in the Fellowship Hall, the refinished church bell taken from the church built in 1885, was unveiled. The refinishing was a gift to the church by Gene Bradshaw and Gary Bradshaw. It is on display in the present Fellowship Hall.







Many women have been honored with Life Memberships, but Mr. Kenneth "Butch" Davis, longtime Sunday School superintendent, board member, and a very willing worker who readily accepts responsibilities, is the only man in the church to be so honored. He was presented his pin in January, 1984. In October, 1984, his wife, Gwen Jackson Davis was presented a pin by the United Methodist Women. This made them the only husband and wife in the church to be given Life Memberships.

Miss Mamie Faison, a deceased member of the Faison Methodist Church, entered into the religious field. She attended Scarrett Bible College and later worked as a deaconess at a Methodist Church in Cramerton, North Carolina.

Mrs. Elizabeth R. Clifton worked diligently to obtain 179 new pew hymnals and 2 large print, loose-leaf organist hymnals at a cost of \$1,723.69 in 1983. Kings Church gave 30 books from their church when it closed, making a total of 209 pew hymnals. The organist hymnals were given in honor of Phyllis Rouse, choir director, and Nelson Precythe, organist. Some of the hymnals were given by friends and relatives in honor and memory of past and present members. Others were direct gifts to the church. The early Methodist Hymnals were without music. They were like a book of poetry.

Many men, women and children have contributed to a fine music program. This includes pianists, organists, choir directors, and choir members. Reverend E. L. Stack wrote in his Conference Report dated January 4, 1926: "We also have a splendid Bright Jewel Band, which is a field of great promise."

Kings Church gave their beautiful piano, which matches the sanctuary furnishings, when they affiliated with the Faison Church.

The Faison Church had hoped for years to become a separate station. In 1982, they finally attained the goal and had a fulltime minister. The short time that it was a station did not produce the expected growth. In 1985, the conference added Friendship and Unity Churches to make the Faison Church part of a three-church circuit.

The church has been blessed with the fruits of the labor and devotion of many men, women, and children who have loved the Faison United Methodist Church.

From the book entitled THE METHODIST MEETING HOUSE by Paul Neff Garber, Bishop Creighton declared: "The building of a church might be a small thing. It is, but it is something. It is useful to a thousand people who never set foot within its walls. It preaches them a sermon every time they pass it and it reminds them in the midst of their activity and thoughtlessness that the world is God's after all."




1985 INTERIOR VIEW OF SANCTUARY BUILT IN 1962
